- The Council is a coordinated effort to celebrate the joy of being Watch Women of our world.



My friend picked me up in Albuquerque and we headed north on I-25. The fuel pump started acting up, so we stopped and put gasoline in the carburetor to get off the freeway. I was driving my friend's van with the inside engine cover off. She was pouring gasoline into the carburetor when the whole engine caught fire!

I opened the door and jumped out, still hanging on the door. I didn't know what to do. The fire was so hot! (Luckily, we were only going about 10-15 mph). Finally, I dropped off on my left side as the van went over a curb and into a vacant field, flames shooting out the windows and doors. I jumped up and saw my friend bail out about two seconds after I did. Her skin was hanging in six inch shreds from her arms and hands. I felt burned and nauseated.

Cars were stopping; I heard sirens, then ambulances. I sat down on the grass, waiting. Everything had changed in one thoughtless moment.

We were put in ambulances and taken to the burn unit of U. of NM Hospital. This happened on Tuesday, October 10 and we were operated on Friday. I only had my right arm burned and grafted. My companion had much more damage and fluid loss. Morphine really helps in pain management but there was lots of pain just the same. I was in for a week.

I'm healing well. I'm staying in Albuquerque till I go to Austin. I've been reading, writing and regrouping (all my equipment is gone, the van was totaled). I am learning the lessons of fire - death & rebirth, purification.

People have been so loving and generous, even strangers. We never know when we're gonna' need each other, that's for sure! This month has definitely been from ecstasy to agony and everything in between.
